I had the pleasure of meeting with John Lowe to discuss the amazing things they do for our Battalion. When asked the steps one takes while being fired upon in a combat situation


John calmly responded, "First asses the situation, second determine the best coarse of action and third execute." The "A matter of fact" tone in his voice told me that he was no amateur.
